## The Major in Middle Grades Education: Social Science

Teacher candidates majoring in Middle Grades (5-8) Social Science complete 38 credits from the Secondary Education Program professional sequence and 48 credits of social science content which includes: HIST 114,115, or 116;HIST 130 or 131; HIST 335, 340, 336, or 324; HIST 305 or 306;HIST 120, 121,123, 124, or 323; HIST 150 or 151; HIST 300; PSYC 100; SOC 100; ESGE 201; ECON 200;and EDUC 387.Candidates can also earn licensure to teach social science in grades 9-12 by completing a major in History Education.

Students majoring in Middle Grade Education: Social Science will also complete the History Education major, which is required for licensure to teach in grades 9-12. Completion of the Middle Grades Education: Social Science major is required to teach in grades 5-8 in Illinois. For additional licensure requirements see an advisor in the Education Department.
